## H.W.A. DIARY

On Sunday morning, August 2, we packed up for the trip from Bonn to Paris. It is always a joy to fly to Paris! The G-II touched down in Les Bourget Airport outside Paris at 1:50 p.m. Mr. and Mrs. Apartian and Sam Kneller, pastor of the Paris Church, were there to meet us. The Apartians had been in France since the previous Thursday preparing for our arrival.

A special service was arranged for 2:30 p.m. at the Sheraton Hotel in the heart of the city. The FM receivers from Germany used the day before in Bad Godesberg had been transported through the night to be used by the French-speaking brethren.

We arrived at the hall right on time. About 500 people waited in the hotel's major ballroom. I was told they represented 17 countries, including the members from Belgium who had traveled to Paris for the meeting.

Mr. Armstrong started by saying it was the first time he had ever spoken in Paris. After his opening comments he asked, "Why can men accomplish so many wonderful things in the technical areas but are so helpless before our human problems--poverty, illiteracy, strife and war? The new President of France can't tell you what is wrong. The President of the United States can't tell you what is wrong. Teachers in Moscow can't tell you. But I can because God has shown me in His Word what is wrong!"

Just after he got into the message, I noticed that Mr. Armstrong was pushing his voice somewhat. I knew this can happen when he doesn't get any reverberation back from the sound system. After looking into it, I found that the hotel microphone produced a buzz when the volume was increased. So the volume control had been set very low. Larry Omasta's men who were on hand to tape the sermon for use on the telecast, found the problem and were able to shut down the mike from backstage. Their mike already in use was tied into the hotel system and the volume was increased. Mr. Armstrong eased the pressure on his voice. Take note all you hall managers when Mr. Armstrong is coming to town!

The next day, Monday, we toured the facility we have in Paris. The Church there has rented upstairs office space that is large enough to hold Sabbath services in and still have some room left over to have a few offices in which to handle the mail that comes in from France, as well as other administrative work.

While there, Mr. Apartian gave Mr. Armstrong and me a review of the French-speaking facet of God's Work. At present La PURE VERITE is sent to 144 different countries. Our Church services are conducted in French in 23 locations around the world. Membership stands at 1,150. I will share more of the details later.

On Tuesday, August 4, we traveled to Geneva. Mr. Armstrong and Mr. Apartian had established the office there in the summer of 1963. HWA had picked the space before the partitions were up and selected the furnishings just over 18 years ago. After passport and customs formalities at the airport, we drove directly to the office which is on the fifth floor of 91 Rue de la Servette, Geneva.

The office staffers were very excited about Mr. Armstrong's visit. He had not visited the office for six or seven years. Larry Omasta and his crew were there to record the event. When Mr. Armstrong entered the office he commented on how the furniture arrangement had changed since his previous visit. He asked Mr. Apartian what became of a particular chair that he picked out for the office! Mr. Apartian explained that the chair had become worn and had been replaced. But Dibar was amazed at how accurately Mr. Armstrong remembered so many details of purchases 18 years ago.

Almost none of the office personnel speak English so communication was a problem. But HWA greeted everyone as he entered each office. The tour ended in a large work area where we all gathered to hear Mr. Apartian explain how the office serves that part of the world. Mr. Armstrong asked questions about the operation and began to discuss Switzerland and its place in Europe. He said he knew that Geneva was the international capital with many international organizations having their headquarters there. Zurich is the financial capital, Berne is the political capital and Lugano is the tourist capital. He discussed the recent history and the present situation. Mr. Apartian translated Mr. Armstrong's comments for the office staff.

After the office tour, the seven of us (Mr. and Mrs. HWA, the Apartians, Ruth Nestor and Evelyn and I) had lunch at the Beau Rivage Hotel beside Lake Geneva.

We spent the afternoon shopping, mostly window-shopping. I did take a good look at a desk clock that I thought was pretty special. I wanted to think it over for a while, but after leaving the shop never got the chance to get back to make the purchase.

We flew back to Paris that evening. On the flight back, Mr. Armstrong came to where Ev and I were sitting on the plane. Mrs. Armstrong also came over. Mr. Armstrong put a box in front of me and said, "Mrs. Armstrong and I want you to have this to help you remember your trip to Geneva." I was absolutely stunned. I just sat there for a time, looking at Mr. Armstrong in disbelief. Evelyn and I opened the box to find that beautiful desk clock! While the Apartians and we had gone into a department store so I could pick up a gift for one of my kids, the Armstrongs decided to slip around to that shop to buy the clock as a present for us. Had I bought the clock myself, it would have been a pleasant reminder of the trip. But the fact that the Armstrongs bought it for us makes it 100 times more special. I'm sure you all understand.

Mr. Armstrong spent the morning of Wednesday, August 5th, writing an article for The PLAIN TRUTH. In the afternoon, he had an appointment with King Leopold of Belgium who happened to be in Paris that day. They spent one hour and forty-five minutes in private discussion. The King is president of the King Leopold III Foundation and Mr. Armstrong is vice-president. Later I mentioned to Mr. Armstrong that the Leopold Foundation is the only thing of which he is vice-president!

On Thursday we were scheduled to fly to Orr, Minnesota so Mr. Armstrong could speak to the third session of the SEP. But the air traffic controllers strike was at a stage that made it uncertain whether we could clear U.S. Customs, visit Orr and then fly on to Los Angeles. As an international flight we would have top priority. As a private domestic flight we would have bottom priority behind military and commercial--and the commercials were having problems then. Mr. Armstrong decided to fly directly to Los Angeles from our fuel stop in Regina, Saskatchewan. We had departed Paris at 3:00 p.m., refueled in Shannon and Regina and arrived Burbank at 6:00 p.m. the same day. We plan on visiting Orr this Sabbath, August 15.

We gathered some figures on how many people Mr. Armstrong has addressed so far in 1981. It is astounding! The Apostle of the Philadelphia era of the Church is a busy one!















BUDGET 1981




PROJECTED INCOME 1981




PROJECTED EXPENDITURE 1981

FROM MINISTERIAL SERVICES

International News

New Zealand Report July was an excellent month for God's Work here, both for mail and income. Over 12,200 items of mail were received, the second highest monthly total in the history of the Work in this part of the world. Income also was the second highest total so far recorded, showing an increase of 28.3% over last July's figure. Income for the year-to-date is now running at an increase of 28.2%, and mail is showing a year-to-date increase of 4.1%.

Over 2,500 responses to our ongoing newspaper flyer promotion of The PLAIN TRUTH magazine were received during the month, bringing to 8,000 the grand total received since the program began in April. Over 4,000 requests for THE UNITED STATES AND BRITAIN IN PROPHECY have already come in as a result of Mr. Armstrong's latest semiannual letter. This is on top of the 7,000 responses to the September 1980 semiannual letter which also offered the U.S. and Britain book. Many letters are now coming in from our subscribers saying how much they have been enlightened by the fascinating information contained in that book.

In addition, Mr. Armstrong's November 1980 letter offering THE MISSING DIMENSION IN SEX prompted over 7,000 replies, and these books have now been mailed out.

The PLAIN TRUTH newsstand program is now beginning to take off in New Zealand and the Pacific Islands. In January this year, 700 copies were being displayed on newsstands. In August the number will have risen to 3,000 and for December we have ordered 22,000. Meanwhile, our mailing list is pushing up over the 50,000 mark and looks like it will soon surpass our previous highest-ever figure of 50,117 set in February 1980.

German-speaking Area News Despite cool and often rainy weather, brethren in Germany, Austria and Switzerland enjoyed numerous socials and outings during July. These included mountain hikes in Austria, a farm barbecue for the Hanover church, and a grill-and-games afternoon for our members in Bonn, Germany. Various youth and singles' activities were also held.

Our sole member in Poland, Victor Przybylla, was able to travel to keep Pentecost with our brethren in East Germany. However, due to increasing suspicion of Polish nationals on the part of neighboring Warsaw Pact countries, he foresees possible difficulty in getting a visa to enter Czechoslovakia to keep the Feast of Tabernacles at Brno. Prayers would be appreciated.

In the month of July we received overall 38% more mail than in July 1980. Our solicited mail was up an amazing 109% over last year. This was due to the overwhelming response to Mr. Armstrong's semiannual letter in the July KLAR & WAHR (German PT). Despite the vacation season, a record-breaking number of booklet cards were returned ordering the booklets offered such as THE UNITED STATES AND BRITAIN IN PROPHECY. Some 3,721 booklet cards were returned (a 6.2% response). In the last two years the highest percentage received was 5.4% of a much smaller subscriber list, or about 2,300 cards. Along with the increased booklet requests was a noticeable increase in the number of visit requests.

Newspaper Ads: Nearly 10,000 Calls Since May 1980

The total telephone response to the newspaper ads since May 8, 1980 is now close to 10,000 calls. Over 95% have resulted from THE WALL STREET JOURNAL. (The remaining calls were responses to the ads in other newspapers dealing with the State versus Church issue.)

We have observed that very few people who responded to these ads were critical or in any way negative. This also confirms that the readers of THE WALL STREET JOURNAL are a higher caliber people.


Response to Co-worker/Member Letters Increases

In the last five years (July 1976 to June 1981), nearly five million letters were sent to members and co-workers.

In 1976 the letters averaged a 19% response. However, by 1978 the average response bottomed out at 15.5%. Then, in 1979, the average increased dramatically to 20% and rose further to 23% in 1980 and 1981.

The following bar graph shows the average response percentages for the last five years:

We feel that the response to co-worker/member letters is another indication of the Work's spiritual condition. From 1976 to 1978 there was a 20% decline, but after 1978, when the Church was being vigorously put back on the right track, there has been a 50% increase!

### ON THE WORLD SCENE

STRIKE! STRIKE! STRIKE! "In the last days," the apostle Paul told Timothy, "men will be lovers of self, lovers of money...arrogant...ungrateful" (II Tim. 3:1-2, RSV).

What better description of our end-time industrial societies? Never before, it seems, has the air been so filled with labor unrest. Today's strikes are not the same as in decades past, with demands revolving around improved work conditions, safety, health care, etc. Today's disruptions smack of pure greed and selfishness!

Professional baseball players in the United States, for example--some earning a million dollars a year--walk off the "job" in protest over the issue of free agency (wanting the freedom to freely jump teams in order to bid salaries up still higher).

It is in the field of governmental employment (so-called "public servants") that the real problem centers today. "Strikes against the people" have become commonplace in the past two decades, especially on the state and local level--from teachers, to nurses to garbagemen, to firemen, police, parole officers and countless other categories. Public transit employees strike, forcing higher fares, cuts in service (yet in Boston, for example, employees of the transit system--drivers and mechanics, etc.--earn \$23,000 a year--up to \$50,000 with overtime!).

On the federal level, the most outstanding example is the current strike by air traffic controllers. These government employees are compensated for their at-times stressful and demanding jobs with average earnings of \$33,000 a year plus overtime, placing them among the highest paid of all U.S. federal workers (the average federal wage is about \$21,500). A beginning controller need only have a high school education, not a college degree, plus three years of general work experience. He or she is trained by the federal government and then starts up a career ladder that provides rapid promotions and raises more generous than those given the typical federal worker.

The contract offer the controllers rejected would have provided each worker with additional pay of about \$4,000 a year. But they wanted a \$10,000 raise for each employee, whether he or she earned \$15,000 or \$49,000 a year--meaning pay raises of from 20 to 67 percent!

President Reagan, for the sake of principle, to say nothing of preserving his economic reform program, had little choice but to refuse to reopen nego-

tiations and to fire the dissenting federal employees. A man of character, the President reminded the strikers of the oath they agreed to when accepting their positions--not to strike against the government. But in our day, a man's word, tragically, means very little. Probably very few controllers paid any attention to this clause in their contracts or to various pieces of legislation, as well as judicial decisions, prohibiting public employee strikes.

So along comes a president who, in his own words, reminds them "to do their duty"--and, suddenly, principle clashed with self-interest. Marvin Stone, editor of the U.S. NEWS AND WORLD REPORT, writes in his column in the August 17, 1981 issue:

Back of this latest strike lies a strange and disturbing conviction, growing over the last few years, that it is fair to violate the law if you disagree with it. This is a false idea, dangerous to the perpetrators themselves as members of the whole. A government of the people must protect its authority from destruction, and strikes against it cannot be tolerated.

Lawlessness--"iniquity"--was prophesied to abound in the end-time era (Matt. 24:12).

Labor unrest, notes Jack Beatty in the LOS ANGELES TIMES, August 9, 1981, is bound to increase:

In a broader perspective, last week's strike may be seen as the first of the national white-collar strikes; we are likely to see more of them, in both the public and the private sectors. The disjuncture between our culture of limitless self-satisfaction and our shrinking inflation-ridden economy make a heaping up of labor-management relations almost inevitable.

A culture of "limitless self-satisfaction"? Note again verses two and four of II Timothy 3: "lovers of self...lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God."

Most people don't realize the "strike weapon"--whether against public or private sectors--is a fairly recent phenomenon in human history. It is now taken so much for granted that AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland calls it a "basic human right." Moreover, the concept of government either owing or guaranteeing one's standard of living has become entrenched in workers' minds in a particularly odious manifestation of the "get" approach to life. Joseph C. Harsch, long-time correspondent for the CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONITOR, writes in his August 11 column:

The controllers wanted a lot more than a six percent raise. What they wanted, along with about everyone else in the United States, and also in most other countries, is to have the government underwrite their standard of living and see to it that they enjoy, every year, an improvement in standard of living, not a decline.

This is the problem of the times for government. It is universal. It does not distinguish between capitalist and communist countries. It does not distinguish between developed and underdeveloped, between North and South, or East and West. Almost everywhere in these times

people look to government to improve their lot, regularly, every year. And they, the people, can become unpleasant if they find their standard of living is actually going down, or is even being threatened with a decline.

Today's younger generation does not realize how remarkable this new condition is, or indeed that it is new. What is the first function of government today? Why, of course, to maintain employment and income.

When I came into the practice of journalism in 1929 such ideas of government responsibility simply did not exist in "respectable" quarters in the U.S. The accepted function of government was to maintain the armed forces, fight wars when necessary, conduct diplomacy, and collect such taxes as people were willing and able to pay.

The idea of the federal government going far outside those activities was novel and highly controversial....It was all right to raise tariffs to protect American industry. But it was not all right for workers to go on strike to try to improve their terms of labor. The idea of a strike was still a radical one.

The great change came during the depression....Franklin Delano Roosevelt was a radical because he conceived of making jobs and supporting them out of the public revenue. Most newspapers, including this one, thundered against the assumption by government of the responsibility of trying to keep people at work. Employment was the function of private enterprise, not of government. What a long way we have come in such a short time....

The air traffic controllers had every reason to think that they could strike and win. That has been the pattern for so long that nothing else seemed credible. Suddenly, it becomes possible, and credible, for a President to say no. It is a turning point. It means that bringing down the inflation is conceivable. It means that there may be a way out of the stagflation bog in which all of the modern industrial democracies have been wallowing for too long.

Labor strife is not limited to the U.S. by any means. Canada, in some respects, has become a "new-world Italy" as far as labor unrest is concerned. When I was in Canada recently, the postal system was shut down (this strike has since been settled on highly inflationary terms), CBC technicians were on strike, as were policemen in Halifax, Nova Scotia. The entire forestry industry in British Columbia--a particularly strike-prone province--was shut down. Governmental authority on all levels seemed too weak to rein in radical labor union leaders. (NATIONAL REVIEW magazine, looking at the country's manifold problems, called Canada "the soft over-belly of North America.")

As a footnote concerning President Reagan and his economic reform program, UPI carried this refreshing story on July 28:

President Reagan, sitting in the Oval Office with visiting Cardinal John Krol of Philadelphia, said Tuesday "the Lord" had a pretty good tax plan of his own. When a reporter jokingly asked the prelate if "the Lord" had an opinion on the President's tax cut proposal, Krol said, "I'll leave that to the experts." But then Reagan volunteered:

"The Lord, really, we could copy him a little bit. The Lord had a pretty simple tax plan--tithing--that his share is a tenth. When we start computing Caesar's share it gets a little bit out of line," the President continued in a Biblical vein. "The Lord said if I prosper you 10 times as much, you will give 10 times as much. He didn't say you'll give 70 times as much."
