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REPORT FROM THE TREASURER'S OFFICE

September 3, 1982

The financial news for the U.S. is improved and therefore encouraging for August. From a disappointingly low year-to-date increase of only 7.6% last month, it has risen to 9.8% this month. You may recall that July had less income than the previous year by almost one percent. August, 1982 showed a remarkable turnaround to 27.3% more than August, 1981.

We have been trying very hard for several months to hold expenses down to a minimum, even though this has hurt a bit in some areas. This effort is paying off. We have returned almost a half million dollars back to reserves this month that had previously been spent. So far for the year, we have spent about one and three-fourths million dollars more than received. Prospects are that we will pay this back in the next month or two. We hope to end the year with some reserves added.

I am sure the prayers of the membership have been largely responsible for this turnaround. Even though the change is not large, it is still quite encouraging.

Don't forget to remind and exhort your congregations about the soon-coming Holy Day offerings. So far this year we have received only 8.8% more in such offerings than last year. When we are in a recession like the present, it will take planning, extra effort and sacrifice to have good offerings. Those who are able will need to give more to make up for those who can't because of unemployment or limited employment.

We hope and pray that the increase will grow more and more so that we can again allocate significant increases to particularly the radio, TV and publishing areas.

FROM MINISTERIAL SERVICES

Questions and Answers

- Question: Should Spokesman Club meetings ever be held on the Sabbath, or started before sundown on the Sabbath? It would be a matter of convenience to those who must travel 60 to 100 miles for services to have Club on the Sabbath, or to begin before sundown.
- Answer: Even though Spokesman Clubs are of great value in training begotten sons of God, meetings should not be conducted on God's Sabbath. Keeping the Sabbath holy should be uppermost in our minds on this day.

Although Spokesman Clubs should not be conducted on the Sabbath, there could be an exception, depending upon circumstances, when a ladies' night could begin toward the end of the Sabbath. Such occasions are often held at a banquet room in a restaurant where the Club members and their wives or dates simply sit down to a served meal and fellowship until the end of the Sabbath. Thus club activities would not begin until after the Sabbath. Unless these circumstances prevail, such activities should be held <u>after</u> the Sabbath or at another time.

Taping of Services at the Feast

As restated recently in the PASTOR GENERAL'S REPORT, the sermons or other parts of Church services should not be taped by members for their personal use. The same policy applies to the Feast of Tabernacles. So please do not plan to take your tape recorder to the Feast for the purpose of taping the services, as this will not be permitted.

Those who are unable to attend the Feast may request to borrow sermon tapes from their pastors afterwards.

Shortage of Hymnals for the Feast

All brethren who own personal copies of the Bible Hymnal are encouraged to bring them to the Feast. There is a special need for extra hymnals at Hawaii, St. Petersburg and Jekyll Island due to the high percentage of transfers. Your attention and help in this matter will be much appreciated.

International News

Spanish-language Areas A total of 170 new people attended PURA VERDAD public Bible lectures given by Mr. Pablo Gonzalez, pastor of the San Juan, Puerto Rico congregation. Seventy-five attended in San Juan on June 20, and 95 attended in New York City on June 26 and 27. About 2.5% of those who were invited came.

In Puerto Rico, most new people came to the meeting carrying a Bible. Most posed questions that indicated a deep knowledge of the Church's literature. One family traveled several hours from Boston in order to attend the New York City meetings. Mr. Gonzalez reported that he was impressed by the high quality of those who attended in both areas. About twelve people seemed very interested in the Church. Mr. Gonzalez will conduct two more lectures (August 8 and 15) in San Juan for the same group that attended in June.

As of June 30, the PV subscription list totaled 143,669--less than 6,000 short of the all-time high of 149,523 reached in August, 1974. Over 26,000

new subscribers were added in May and June by the hard-working mail processing staff--more than in any other two-month period since 1969! We now stand a bit short of the 150,000 subscribers expected at the end of June, but if the current pace continues, the year-end goal of 200,000 subscribers is likely to be attained.

Counting newsstand copies, total PV circulation at mid-year stood at 220,169. This figure breaks down as follows: 143,669 subscribers, 47,500 U.S. newsstand, 5,000 Puerto Rico newsstand and 24,000 Mexico newsstand.

Mail originating from Mexico outnumbered that received from any other country during May and June, with 12,238 cards, letters and coupons received in Pasadena and Mexico City. This is due to increased media efforts to boost the subscription list in Mexico City, including newsstands, newspaper and magazine ads, PV insert cards, cardholders and "mini-PV" distribution. At the end of June there were 18,559 subscribers in Mexico--34% more than just four months ago, and 47% more than one year ago.

Mr. Armstrong's semiannual letter of last January netted nearly 33,000 responses by the end of June. Responses will continue to be received for many months to come, and the estimated response will be 32%. The countries with the highest percentage of response were: Costa Rica, 54%; El Salvador, 53%; Guatemala, 48%; Colombia, 44%; and Nicaragua, 43%.

The countries yielding the highest <u>number</u> of <u>responses</u> were: U.S.A., 8,080; Colombia, 6,094; Mexico, 4,603; Puerto Rico, 1,950; and Chile, 1,925.

Ads placed in top daily newspapers throughout the Spanish-and-Portuguesespeaking world have yielded many new subscribers as the following figures show: Guatemala, 2,184; Portugal, 175; Brazil, 846; Honduras, 263; Costa Rica, 92; Venezuela, 237; El Salvador, 1,451; Colombia, 3,259; Argentina, 1,200; Spain, 688; Paraguay, 142. The case of Paraguay is interesting in that until the placement of two small ads in the 90,000 circulation ABC COLOR newspaper, no advertising had <u>ever</u> been done in the landlocked nation of 3.2 million. Until recently, there were as many subscribers in that country receiving the German magazine (KLAR & WAHR) as the Spanish.

ON THE WORLD SCENE

JAPANESE ATTEMPT TO REWRITE HISTORY: ASIANS UNITE IN PROTEST

An attempt on the part of Japan's Education Ministry to force changes in textbooks dealing with Japanese actions in the Second World War has unleashed a tidal wave of protest throughout Asia. The governments of China and South Korea have officially protested the planned textbook revisions. Officials and news media in Taiwan, North Korea, Malaysia and Singapore have also voiced their concern.

The biggest storm of protest surrounds the new description of the old Imperial Army's activities in China in 1937 and afterward. Instead of labeling the army's actions as "shinryaku" (aggression) the Education Ministry ordered new textbooks to use the word "sinnya" (advance). One textbook author quoted a government official as explaining that "'shinryaku' gave the false impression of an evil act."

Older textbooks tell of some 200,000 Chinese being rounded up and shot during the infamous "rape of Nanking" in 1937. The latest account blames the Nanking slaughter on the resistance of Chinese troops. The Korean national uprising of 1919 against the harsh Japanese overlords (Japan took over the peninsula in 1905) is now glossed over as a "riot." The 700,000 Koreans put into forced labor camps during World War II are now said to have been "drafted."

The South Korean government has demanded that the textbook revisions be rescinded, and that it will "never drop" this demand. Chinese authorities in Peking are so furious that they are threatening to cancel the trip of Japanese Prime Minister Zeuko Suzuki to Peking later this month unless the revisions are amended. To underline their opposition, Chinese newspapers and television re-released photographs and newsreel footage of Japanese military brutality committed in the 1930's and 40's. The papers also carried horrifying new reports of Japanese germ-warfare experiments in which 3,000 Chinese prisoners reportedly died.

Prime Minister Suzuki has announced that in the wake of the sea of protests he would approve changes to make the passages in the new books "more appropriate" to the wishes of Japan's neighbors. He will have a tough time of it, however, with Education Ministry officials who are described as "unrepentant and defiant."

Mr. Suzuki himself did little to calm Asian fears recently when he became the first post-war chief of government to pay official homage at the Shinto shrine dedicated to Japanese military dead. He and his entire cabinet led more than 7,000 guests in a service mourning the war dead, including those executed by allied occupation forces as war criminals.

For a background to these disturbing events in the Far East, first is this account from the CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONITOR, August 12, 1982:

The question might be asked: Why has Japan suddenly decided on the need to rewrite history? In fact, the process has been under way for 30 years. But the current revisions are the most sweeping, and clumsy Japanese explanations of the need for such revisions have merely exacerbated foreign anger. A Japanese Cabinet member, for example, made a statement that the Japanese occupation of the Korean Peninsula was justified and even beneficial.

Essentially, Japan feels it is now a powerful, free nation that doesn't have to accept other countries' version of history. Over the past three decades, the Education Ministry, with powerful support from within the ruling Liberal Democratic Party, has battled tirelessly for a "correct Japanese view" of the war, which it thought was ignored by the American occupation and then the left-wing-dominated teachers union (Nikkyoso)....

Japanese education over the past 30 years, in fact, has been a pitched battle between Nikkyoso and the Education Ministry, which the latter now feels it has won through the elimination of "biased textbooks...." Part of the government's motivation, it could be argued, is to promote national pride and patriotism and make possession of a strong defense force respectable again.

In the August 6, 1982 LOS ANGELES TIMES, syndicated columnist Ellen Goodman discusses that the dilemma now confronting Japan is one that many powers have had as they attempt to deal with the skeletons of their national history.

As of this fall, the Japanese will no longer have launched "invasions" in China, Southeast Asia and the Pacific. They will have "advanced." In the rape of Nanking, they will have no longer "killed and assaulted" 200,000 Chinese willfully but rather "in the midst of the confusion...."

To understand the impulse of the Japanese Education Ministry, just imagine the difficulty of teaching young children about the brutality, the aggression, the wrong committed by the country that they are also expected to love. To understand the effect of these rewritings on Asians (an estimated 18 million of whom died in World War II), just imagine how we would respond if the Japanese began to teach their children that on Dec. 7, 1941, the Imperial Air Force "advanced" on Pearl Harbor.

The entire incident is in many ways a textbook case. It's a textbook case on the complicated role that history plays in our lives, our understanding of our world, country, families. It's a textbook case on the manipulation of history in the service of politics. What happened in Japan is not all that unusual. In some way or other, every culture--every country--struggles with its past. To this day, there are even heated arguments in the United States about whether our early history should be taught as national heroics, led by profiles in courage, or with a more earthy ambiguity.

The more uneasy we are about that past, the more tarnished it seems to us, the more trouble we have telling it to our children. The Japanese have subtly muted their own blame. The official Egyptian guide who led a group of friends to the Pyramids three years ago described how they were built by "volunteer labor." For generations we have had extraordinary difficulty in teaching children about the realities of slavery or the myths of cowboys and Indians....

But the national autobiography of aggression and guilt is subject to the most peculiar revisions. Germany doesn't rest any more easily on its recent past than does Japan. It took until 1962 for German schools to teach children about the death camps. Today there are new "historians" who assault those dead with grotesque rewrites of Nazi reality, calling the Holocaust a hoax.

It is as hard for nations as it is for parents to talk about their wrongs. They want respect from the young, and want to instill self-respect in the young. But we can't teach false pride. When we expunge guilt, pretend that it didn't happen, we are tainted by it, committing the ultimate assault on the victims.

Combined with hints now that some government officials want to "break the budget barrier" in military spending (until now set at one percent of Japan's GNP) one can see why Japan's neighbors are showing more concern than ever over Japan's future course.
