# PASTOR GENERAL'S REPORT TO THE MINISTRY OF THE WORLDWIDE CHURCH OF GOD

International News

Caribbean News The Feast of Tabernacles 1982 was observed at seven English-language Feast sites throughout the Caribbean. Barbados, with an attendance of 556, was host to the largest group. Attendance at the other sites was as follows: Bermuda, 489; Tobago, 465; Bahamas, 429; Jamaica, 376; St. Lucia, 235; and Guyana, 114. The total attendance of 2,664 was 10% more than the Feast last year.

The offerings for the two holy days during the Feast showed an increase of 17% over last year's offerings. The total offerings, when worked out in relation to the total attendance, gave us an average of U.S. \$19.32 per person.

The highlight of October was the apostle's visit to the island of Bermuda on October 31st. Mr. Stan Bass, Regional Director for the Caribbean, and Mr. Roland Sampson, Pastor of the Bermuda Church, along with the majority of the members, were present at the airport to meet and welcome Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong. During his three-day stay in Bermuda Mr. Armstrong was able to meet with the Deputy Governor, the Premier, and the U.S. Consul General. He also gave a PLAIN TRUTH lecture Monday night, November 1st. The next day he departed Bermuda for the next leg of his journey.

Total incoming mail for the region during October was 39% more than October, 1981 and 6.2% over September. Mail containing money showed a tremendous increase--94% over last October and 96% over September!

The total income received in October was boosted by the Feast of Tabernacles. October's income was 44.2% greater than October of last year and 29.5% greater than September. It was the largest amount received for any month of this year so far.

<u>Report From Utrecht</u> The Dutch language area was blessed by God with an unforgettable Feast of Tabernacles. Peace and unity were the dominant factors at the Feast, with a record attendance of 446--an increase of 29.5%. The offering on the first day resulted in a 14% increase. Offerings on the Last Great Day resulted in a 13.4% increase.

Plans call for fall and winter advertisements for the promotion of De ECHTE WAARHEID (Dutch PLAIN TRUTH). In November a front-page ad in a Dutch language Belgian winter paper having a circulation of 2,200,000. And in February of 1983 a flyer will be placed in the monthly magazine of the Netherlands Automobile Association which has a circulation of 1,000,000.

Also in February, 1983, we will be able to place for the first time a fullpage ad on the back cover of one of the Dutch TV guides, TROS KOMPAS, which has a circulation of 900,000. As a result of this fall and winter ad campaign we hope that our total list of subscribers will be boosted from the present 40,000 to 60,000.

Income for the year to date increased by 9.5%. Incoming mail showed an increase of 52%, and church attendance was up 17.4% while membership increased 9.7%.

#### PUBLISHING SERVICES UPDATE

## Newsstand Distribution to Hold at Current Levels for 1983

We certainly appreciate the enthusiastic efforts of the ministry and the newsstand representatives in your support of the Newsstand Distribution Program during 1982. The results of those efforts have been extremely rewarding in terms of PLAIN TRUTH circulation growth and in dollars saved by the Work of God.

We now have 14,000 outlets and over 7,000 brethren involved in the program throughout the United States. The members have dedicated much of their personal time to the success of the program. If the Church had to pay for this distribution service through an agency, it would cost us \$1,500,000 per year! Through their and the ministry's diligent efforts, the brethren have brought to the attention of people throughout the U.S. a much greater awareness of God's truth through the Newsstand Distribution Program. Mr. Armstrong has stated that a person just picking up The PLAIN TRUTH magazine at a newsstand outlet has received a witness.

Presently there is a substantial amount of money being invested in the newsstand program as the result of a decision made last summer by Mr. Armstrong to expand the newsstand edition to 48 pages, making it identical to the subscription PLAIN TRUTH. Mr. Armstrong felt that this would allow for a greater variety of material to appeal to a broader spectrum of readers, therefore increasing newsstand response through broader reader interest. Therefore, this increase in the size of the newsstand edition will be our newsstand expansion for 1983.

We are in the process of reviewing our total distribution in the U.S. in order to maximize the program. Unfortunately, because of limited funds at this time, we are unable to accommodate the numerous requests that are coming in asking for extra magazines for the various outlets around the country. However, your requests will be considered in this study, and if at that time we can reallocate magazines to your respective areas, it will be done.

In 1983 we will need to draw upon your expertise and dedication even more than in 1982. We will be working towards maximizing public awareness to the magazine and improving its visibility through better, more prestigious outlets. Further information on this subject will be forthcoming in our Circulation/Newsstand Newsletter. Keep up the good work!

## PT Receives Unusual Visibility In Oregon

The GAZETTE-TIMES of Corvallis, Oregon, Tuesday, November 16, 1982 carried a headline in the sports section, "OSU's Taylor Barks Plain Truth." Mr. Lionel Taylor, assistant football coach for Oregon State, while addressing an audience at Nendel's Inn in Corvallis regarding the background of Oregon State's football problems, appeared before the audience clutching a PLAIN TRUTH magazine in his hands. After addressing the crowd with a very lively commentary regarding his football status, it was reported that Mr. Taylor ended his speech by stating that he hoped his football team's record would change with the upcoming Saturday afternoon game. With that concluding remark, Taylor was reported as picking up his PLAIN TRUTH magazine and sitting down.

### ON THE WORLD SCENE

UNIVERSITY LIFE TODAY: AIMLESS, NIHILISTIC, CORRUPTED BY DESTRUCTIVE FEMINISM

Much of the decay in modern Western society is fostered in its institutions of higher learning. This is especially true regarding the state-run schools and large private universities which have been all but divorced from the philosophical moorings of their founding churches. One of the most incisive criticisms of university life and (mis)education appeared in the December 10, 1982 issue of NATIONAL REVIEW. The article, titled "Our Listless Universities," was written by Allan Bloom, professor of the Committee on Social Thought and the College at the University of Chicago. Professor Bloom is an expert on the philosophers of the ancient world. Here are some of his comments:

I begin with my conclusion: <u>students in our best universities do</u> <u>not believe in anything</u>, and those universities are doing nothing about it, nor can they. An easy-going American kind of nihilism has descended upon us, a nihilism without terror of the abyss. [Nihilism, according to WEBSTER'S SEVENTH NEW COLLEGIATE DICTION-ARY, is "a doctrine that denies any objective ground of truth and especially of moral truths." It is a "viewpoint that traditional values and beliefs are unfounded and that existence is senseless and useless."]

The great questions--God, freedom, and immortality, according to Kant--hardly touch the young. And the universities, which should encourage the quest for the clarification of such questions, are the very source of the doctrine which makes that quest appear futile.

The heads of the young are stuffed with a jargon derived from the despair of European thinkers, gaily repackaged for American consumption and presented as the foundation for a pluralistic society....One suspects that modern thought has produced an artificial soul....The new soul's language consists of terms like value, ideology, <u>self</u>, commitment, <u>identity</u>--every word derived from recent German philosophy, and each carrying a heavy baggage of dubious theoretical interpretation of which its users are blissfully unaware.

The new language subtly injects into our system the perspective of "do your own thing" as the only plausible way of life. I know that sounds vaguely passe, a remnant leftover from the Sixties. But it is precisely the routinization of the passions of the Sixties that is the core of what is going on now, just as the Sixties were merely a radicalization of earlier tendencies....

The insatiable appetite for freedom to live as one pleases thrives on this aspect of modern democratic thought...<u>There are</u> <u>no absolutes: freedom is absolute</u>. A doctrine that gives <u>equal</u> <u>rights to any way of life whatsoever</u> has the double advantage of licensing one's own way of life and of <u>giving one a democratic</u> <u>good conscience</u>. The very lack of morality is a morality and permits what Saul Bellow has called "easy virtue," a mixture of egotism and high-mindedness. Now, in feeling as well as in speech, a large segment of our young are open, open to every "lifestyle."

This licentious approach to life (Gal. 5:19), notes author Bloom, "masquerades as the essential democratic theory." A corollary of this way of thinking is constant vigilance against any person or group who "discriminates" against anyone else's way of life. Every lifestyle (such as homosexuality) is as acceptable as any other. No one lifestyle, religion, political philosophy or economic system is any better than any other. "Judging by the fruits" is irrelevant and is indeed "prejudicial" or "discriminatory." Schools once produced citizens, or gentlemen, or believers; now they produce the unprejudiced. A university professor confronting entering freshmen can be almost certain that most of them will know that there are no absolutes and that one cannot say that one culture is superior to another. They can scarcely believe that someone might seriously argue the contrary; the attempt to do so meets either self-satisfied smiles at something so old-fashioned or outbursts of anger at a threat to decent respect for other human beings. In the Thirties this teaching was actually warring against some real prejudices of race, religion, or nation; but what remains now is mostly the means for weakening conviction when convictions have disappeared....When we talk about the West's lack of conviction or lack of will, we show that we are beginning to recognize what has happened to us. Exhortations to believe, however, are useless.

Professor Bloom then proceeds to give three conclusions that he has derived from longtime personal observation of the ways and attitudes of students as they proceed through their university careers. These conclusions involve books, music and sex--the latter dealing especially with the <u>pernicious influence of feminism</u> upon the modern student's entire approach to human experience, what is of historical value (very little) and what is not (almost everything).

1. Books. They are no longer an important part of the lives of students. "Information" is important, but profound and beautiful books are not where they go for it. They have no books that are companions and friends to which they look for counsel, companionship, inspiration, or pleasure...The link between the classic books and the young, which...is the only means of connecting the here and the now with the always, this link has been broken. The Bible and Plutarch have ceased to be a part of the soul's furniture, an incalculable loss of fullness and awareness of which the victims are unaware.

The old books are still around, but one "knows" that they contain mere opinions, no better than any others....It means the young have no heroes, no objects of aspiration....

2. Music...Many students do not watch much television while in college, but they do listen to music...And classical music is dead, at least as a common taste. Rock is all there is. There is now one culture for everyone, in music as in language. It is a music that moves the young powerfully and immediately. Its beat goes to the depth of their souls and inarticulately expresses their inarticulate longings. Those longings are sexual, and the beat appeals almost exclusively to that. It caters to kiddy sexuality, at best to puppy love....

The most powerful formative influence on children between 12 and 18 is not the school, not the church, not the home, but rock music and all that goes with it. It is not an elevating but a leveling influence. The children have as their heroes banal, drug- and sex-ridden guttersnipes who foment rebellion not only against parents but against all noble sentiments. This is the emotional nourishment they ingest in these precious years. It is the real junk food.... 3. Sex. No change has been so rapid, so great, and so surprising as the change in the last twenty years concerning sex and the relations between the sexes....

The great change in sexual behavior has taken place in two stages. The first is what was called the sexual revolution. This meant simply that pre- and extra-marital sex became much more common, and the various penalties for promiscuity were either much reduced or disappeared...But even more powerful than all of the above changes are the effects of feminism, which is still early in its career of reform and is the second stage of the great change of which I am speaking....

There is an almost universal agreement, among those who count for university students, that feminism is simply justified as is... [Elitism--which would include racism and sexism, the author states elsewhere, are the "paramount sins of the day."] Women today have, to use our new talk, an agenda. Also, it is their movement, so they are involved and excited, have much to talk about. The men, on the other hand, are waiting to be told what is on the agenda and ready to conform to its demands. There is little inclination to resist.

All the principles have been accepted; it only remains to see how to live by them. Women are to have careers just as do men and, if there is to be marriage, the wife's career is not to be sacrificed to the man's; home and children are a shared responsibility; when and if there are to be children is up to the woman, and the decision to terminate or complete a pregnancy is a woman's right. Above all, women are not to have a "role" imposed on them. They have a right of self-definition. The women were the victims and must be the leaders in their recovery from victimization. The men, as they themselves see it, have to be understanding and flexible....

The result is a desexualization of life, all the while that a lot of sexual activity is going on, and a reduction of the differences between the sexes...Sex is all right, but it creates a problem...Dating is almost a thing of the past...<u>Above all</u>: no courtship or courtliness. Now there is friendship, mutual respect, communication; realism without foolish fabulation or hopes.

Author Bloom then concludes by projecting the disastrous impact that feminism, fostered in the universities, has upon the entire educational process:

This conviction has as its first consequence that <u>all old books</u> are no longer relevant, because their authors were sexists (if they happened to be women, they were maimed by living in sexist society)...And in the absence (temporary, of course) of a literature produced by feminism to rival the literature of Sophocles, Shakespeare, Racine, and Stendhal, students are without literary inspiration...These are the tenets of the egalitarian creed, and today its primary tenet is that the past was sexist. Of course, the Bible is viewed by the feminist revolutionaries as perhaps the most "sexist" book of all. Professor Bloom's analysis should make us realize that the impact of feminism upon education and society as a whole is here to stay--E.R.A. or no E.R.A.! Educated men, afraid of appearing to "discriminate," are supinely conceding the victory to the feminist cause.

This world's institutions of higher learning, cut off from God, could never be relied upon to dispense God's Truth. That we realize. Author Bloom admits as much when he states that "the meaning of life is unclear, but that is why we must spend our lives clarifying it rather than letting it go. The university's function is to remind students of the importance and urgency of the question and give them the means to pursue it." But because of the inroads of nihilism, egalitarianism and now feminism, the original character-shaping function of the university has gone by the boards. Education in what one might call "worldly righteous" character--high moral standing, patriotism, etc.--is no longer relevant. "The university," Professor Bloom states, "has no vision, no view of what a human being must know in order to be considered educated."

Thanks be to God that He has used Mr. Armstrong to put Ambassador College back on the track, rescuing it from the blackened, moral abyss of the educational system in the "enlightened" Western world.
