REPORT FROM THE TREASURER'S OFFICE

May 5, 1983

We now have the income and expense figures through April. This, surprisingly, is already one-third of the year. It doesn't seem possible that time has passed so quickly. We still have not seen an upturn in income, though considering the past and current economic conditions, we have done well. Income for the month of April was 13.9 percent more than last April, which brought the year-to-date through April to a plus 11.1 percent over the same period a year ago.

Bank balances are approximately the same as they were a year ago. It seems that one week we will be above last year, and the next week we will be below last year. Expenses are still high, and current projections show a deficit of about \$125,000 by the end of the year. I expect that figure to improve soon and that we will have some increase to reserves before the year is out.

A number of you have expressed your interest and appreciation for these reports. I hope they are helpful and informative for all of you.

U.S./Canadian Feast Sites Still Open (Clarification of Recent Memo)

PUBLISHING SERVICES UPDATE

Update on Elson's and "Good Neighbor" Supermarket PT Distribution

Distribution of The PLAIN TRUTH in Elson's gift stores, which began in over 100 shops April 1, 1983, has been extremely successful, apart from a few minor misunderstandings and problems in one or two locations.

We have had very enthusiastic reports from New York and Atlanta, which are the two areas that have the largest concentrations of Elson's stores. New York is going through 1,800 magazines a day, and Atlanta approximately 600 magazines a day. All other hotel locations are reporting that they use 200 magazines per week.

There have been several instances where the hotel or airport management has demanded the removal of The PLAIN TRUTH from Elson's newsstand racks. Elson's has informed us that they view this as a possible precedent. They are very concerned, and are taking the position that the hotel or airport management has no jurisdiction over what they may or may not carry in their stores.

In many cases, great favor has been shown the publication by the Elson's management. As the relationship develops, we are confident that the program will continue to be a great success.

During the first week of May, the New York warehouses of Supermarket Communication Systems, Inc. will receive 25,000 PLAIN TRUTHs, which they will distribute in 563 supermarkets in the New York area.

The magazines will be placed in a three-inch basket with two facings side by side held upright by a wire retaining clip. The space on each rack will be marked by a piece of tape with the words PLAIN TRUTH written on it.

Subsequent stockings of the racks will be performed by the brethren of the New York area Churches who have been organized to handle supermarkets in the areas where they live or work. At the same time SCS receives its shipment, our own depots will receive 79,000 magazines with which to do the subsequent stockings of the racks.

The New York City brethren are highly enthusiastic about this open door and are determined to make the program a success.

Once again, as Mr. Armstrong requested, please continue to encourage your congregations to fervently pray that the finances required for this program will come in so it can be expanded into hundreds of additional stores in the near future.

ON THE WORLD SCENE

THE BISHOPS AND THE BOMB; "GREEN LIGHT" FOR MOSCOW IN WESTERN HEMISPHERE

One gets the distinct impression that the United States is being "set up" for the time when "they have blown the trumpet and made everyone ready, but no one goes to battle" (Ezek. 7:14). By a nearly unanimous vote on May 3, America's Roman Catholic bishops adopted a precedent-setting 155-page letter on war and peace that puts them squarely in the forefront of the peace movement and in opposition to several key parts of U.S. defense policy. The letter was approved at the National Conference of Catholic Bishops meeting in Chicago by a vote of 238 to 9. The final version calls for a halt to the nuclear arms race. It accepts deterrence, or the possession of a nuclear arsenal, as a "strictly conditional" defense strategy valid only temporarily while steps towards disarmament are pursued. Reported the May 4 LOS ANGELES TIMES:

The letter now becomes "teaching doctrine" for the nation's 50 million Catholics. It is a sweeping departure from views of the previous generation of U.S. Catholic leaders, who generally voiced uncritical acceptance of the morality of American military action. At a press conference Tuesday, Archbishop Thomas Kelly of Louisville, a former general secretary of the U.S. bishops, was asked if the document could allow for any use of nuclear weapons, even in a retaliatory strike against nuclear attack. "We do not know of any case in which nuclear weapons can be used," Kelly replied.

The document, titled "The Challenge of Peace: God's Promise and Our Response," calls for a "no first strike" policy, counter to the U.S.-Atlantic Alliance options for such strikes to defend Western Europe....

The letter is careful to point out the difference between "general moral principles," which are binding on Catholics, and "specific applications of those principles," which are not binding.

UPI, in a May 5 dispatch added:

The nation's Roman Catholic bishops...supported what one bishop called the "concept" of a nuclear freeze and used language that is almost exactly that of the freeze movement in urging a "halt" in the testing, production and deployment of new nuclear weapons systems. But they carefully dissociated themselves from any specific political proposals for a freeze....

"The whole world must summon the moral courage and technical means to say 'No' to nuclear conflict; 'No' to weapons of mass destruction; 'No' to an arms race which robs the poor and the vulnerable; and 'No' to the moral danger of a nuclear age which places before humankind indefensible choices of constant terror or surrender," the bishops said....

The vote, although never in doubt, was a victory for the doves and a defeat for the Reagan Administration, which had lobbied the bishops heavily in an effort to soften their anti-nuclear position and endorse Administration strategies for arms control. "We shouldn't be surprised at the direction things are going," Bishop Pierre Dumaine of San Jose, Calif., told reporters at one point. "After all, the Holy Spirit was a dove."

"It's a very, very strong position on peace...said Archbishop John R. Roach of St. Paul-Minneapolis, President of the Bishops' Conference. "It will have a strong impact on the public policy debate in our country."

One such impact will certainly be felt by Roman Catholics serving in the U.S. military. They are now thrown into a period of moral confusion. Reports another UPI dispatch of May 4:

Roman Catholics serving in the armed forces should refuse any order to detonate a nuclear weapon, Archbishop John R. Quinn said Wednesday. He compared the position of an American soldier ordered to detonate nuclear arms to soldiers in Nazi Germany ordered to participate in war crimes—saying soldiers are simply obligated to refuse to obey immoral orders. "Nuremburg already established that," he said, referring to the war crimes trials of former Nazis.

He said not even the President of the United States could "justifiably force someone to do something that is morally wrong." The President would "exceed his authority" in ordering someone who had moral objections to the use of nuclear weapons to detonate such armaments.

Quinn...said some sections of the letter would become the official moral position of the church in the United States. U.S. priests, in instructing or counseling Catholics about issues of

nuclear warfare and weaponry, would be required to make those official teachings known.... He said the letter was designed to bring the world closer to a "real peace"....

Quinn said he expected the Roman Catholic community throughout the world to eventually take a similar position and that the letter could be the first step toward destroying the "nuclear spectre that so enshrouds our world today."

Meanwhile...in Western Europe

It is believed that the "nuclear freeze" mentality has been pushed on the U.S. bishops by influential liberal lay members. But, interestingly enough, bishops in Europe, especially in West Germany and France have resisted the "peace, peace" approach of the U.S. bishops. Here is an article, datelined Bonn, that appeared in the April 28 NEW YORK TIMES:

The Conference of Catholic Bishops in West Germany made public a pastoral letter on war and peace today that asserts "nuclear deterrence is not a reliable instrument for preventing war in the long run." But the letter, approved by the country's 68 bishops earlier this month, departs significantly from a proposed pastoral letter by American bishops in supporting the allied policy of "flexible response," which holds that nuclear weapons might be needed to halt an overwhelming conventional attack by the Soviet Union.

"The intention of preventing war with all one's strength must become credible by virtue of the choice of the whole range of arms," the bishops say. The methods chosen to pursue one's security policy should be measured in terms of the goal of preventing war."

The document has added significance since the West German Government is led by the Christian Democratic Party, which traditionally enjoys the church's support. Many of the party's leaders are active Catholics. The Government, which was advised beforehand of the letter, applauded its appearance today in a detailed statement that espoused many of its basic principles. Senior Government officials were deeply displeased by the American bishops' draft document. They said its opposition to the first use of nuclear weapons weakened the credibility of the United States nuclear deterrent in Europe.

The German bishops' letter is the latest contribution to a growing church debate in Europe, spurred in part by the American bishops' action... The Dutch bishops, traditionally known for their liberal stance, are preparing a pastoral document that is also expected to condemn increases in arms. The French bishops have supported their West German counterparts. Joseph Cardinal Hoffner, leader of the German bishops, said at a news conference that the French bishops had thanked them in a letter for their "collegial stand"....

Cardinal Hoffner said... "We do not touch on the use of nuclear weapons. We deal with the promotion of peace, the reduction of

force and the avoidance of war... Tracing the notion of the "just war" from the church fathers to present papal teaching, the bishops reject the idea of absolute pacifism for the state, whose function, they say, is to limit individual and social injustice. But they assert that "in view of the incredible destructive power of modern arms, the call for peace has assumed a special degree of urgency."

In sum, the opposing positions of the Roman Catholic leadership in the U.S. and Western Europe only fuels the imperative for political leaders in Europe to create a dependable and independent European nuclear force.

"Green Light" for Hemispheric Insurgents Given

Following up our Special Report of last week, mark down May 2, 1983 on your calendars. It chronicled another milestone in the step-by-step march to victory for hostile anti-U.S. forces in Central America. On that date majority Democrats on the House Intelligence Committee pushed through a measure that would cut off covert (secret) funds for U.S.-backed anti-Sandinista rebels in Nicaragua. The Reagan Administration has been supporting such groups inside Nicaragua itself for two reasons: First, to interdict arms moving out of Nicaragua into El Salvador, and second, to help pro-Western elements kicked out of Nicaragua after the 1979 revolution to hopefully have a role in moderating the Marxist government in Nicaragua.

Even though the legislation faces an uphill battle in the Senate, and possible presidential veto, it flashes an initial green light to Moscow, Havana and Managua that "all systems are go" for the military overthrow of the entire isthmus! It says, in effect, that Marxist Nicaragua (not pro-Western El Salvador) is now--incredibly--a protected sanctuary of the U.S. Congress.

At the same time, the measure approved by the committee authorized \$80 million for overt funding to threatened Central American nations to assist them in capturing arms shipments flowing into their countries from Nicaragua, Cuba or other nations. What this means is that the United States is indeed committing itself to fighting a war, Vietnam-style. During that conflict, the U.S. placed the main aggressor, North Vietnam, "off limits" for the most part. It permitted weapons to flow from the Soviet Union into the north, virtually unimpeded, then tried to bomb them to smithereens from the air as they moved down the jungle-shrouded capillaries of the Ho Chi Minh Trail network.

In this war, the main weapon forwarders, Cuba and Nicaragua, are placed "off limits." (Cuba has been so since an "understanding" with Moscow ending the 1962 missile crisis.) Weapons will thus flow in even greater quantities into Nicaragua by sea and by air. From there the route to El Salvador is by sea (at night) and overland through Honduras.

The concept of letting the arms in and then trying to hunt them down along the way is absurd--much like trying to snatch bullets in the air after they're fired from a machine gun. The May 9, 1983 issue of TIME noted the Ho Chi Minh Trail-type of network which funnels arms into El Salvador:

Once in El Salvador, the pipeline becomes even more labyrinthine. Materiel from the Jiquilisco [coastal] area is moved by boat,

oxcart or mule train toward guerrilla camps in the center and northwest of the country. Supplies [also] come overland across Honduras... Every guerrilla route has at least one alternative path. In areas where the rebels are strong, the alternative routes often interconnect; at night, smugglers can slip right under the noses of Salvadoran soldiers.

The White House immediately charged that the House Intelligence Committee, by its action, appears to condone Nicaragua's use as a base for Central American insurgency. President Reagan charged that the measure "was literally taking away the ability of the executive branch to carry out its constitutional responsibilities." The President also said for the first time why he feels covert aid is sometimes necessary. The Administration needs the authority to channel covert aid to U.S.-backed groups in Central America, he said, because some nations in the region might not be willing to accept overt assistance offered for the same objective.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick's Analysis

Last night in Los Angeles I had the opportunity to hear Jeane Kirkpatrick, U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, address a World Affairs Council dinner. Mrs. Kirkpatrick discussed her multi-nation trip to the embattled region this past February, in which she had intimate conversations with political, business and labor union leaders. The first question nearly always asked her, she said, was "What are you Americans going to do about it?"--the "it" referring to the Communist insurrections threatening the isthmus. Others would ask: "Don't you Americans understand what's going on here?"

If Americans don't know--or are not being told by the standard news mediathe Soviets certainly know what they're doing, Mrs. Kirkpatrick explained. In Panama and Costa Rica, the softening up prior to insurrection is well underway, said the Ambassador. In these two countries, the airwaves are saturated with propaganda from Radio Venceremos, the Salvadoran guerrilla station. In the past few years, 700 young Costa Ricans have gone to Cuba and the Soviet bloc on fully-paid education scholarships. During the same period of time none went to the U.S. From Panama, 1,100 young people have received such education; three went to the U.S. on similar no-expense terms. (It reminds me of the time when I arrived at the airport outside Panama City in 1968 on a flight from Los Angeles. Ahead of me, at the customs inspection, were several Panamanian high school students returning from a conference in Bulgaria. They had connected the flight in Guatamala City. I was amazed to see their suitcases stuffed with scores of Communist books, pamphlets and phonograph records.)

Mr. Nixon's Somber Warning

In an article specially written for the May 2, 1983 WALL STREET JOURNAL, former President Richard M. Nixon warned, under the title "Don't Let Salvador Become Another Vietnam":

There are chilling parallels between what is happening in El Salvador and what happened in Vietnam.... Today, there is strong support in Congress for massive cutbacks in President Reagan's arms request for El Salvador. Major arguments...are that the government is corrupt, repressive and inefficient and that by aligning ourselves with a losing cause we may become mired in another Vietnam. Before making that decision, Congress should remind itself of what happened in Vietnam.

The last American combat forces left Vietnam 10 years ago after the signing of the Paris Peace Agreement on Jan. 27, 1973.... Between 1973 and 1975, Congress cut the arms budget for South Vietnam by 76%. The Soviet Union, on the other hand, doubled its shipments of arms to North Vietnam. It is not surprising that in 1975 the North Vietnamese...rolled into Saigon.

What followed was one of the great tragedies of history. The "liberators" brought ruthless tyranny. Under the Thieu government there were some elections, some opposition, some freedom. Now there is none.... There were no boat people before the communists took over. Now 110,000 fleeing their liberators have drowned in the China Sea. Hundreds of thousands have been tortured and killed in "re-education" camps. In Cambodia alone over three million have been murdered and starved to death....

The choice now is clear. The Congress can approve President Reagan's request or reduce it below the level needed by the Salvadoran government to defeat the guerrillas. If they oppose the president's request they can justify their action by proclaiming that they are preventing the United States from getting bogged down in another Vietnam. But they cannot escape the responsibility for what happens thereafter. When we get out, the communists will move in....

As U.N. Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick points out, the most generous excuse for those who cut aid to South Vietnam at a time when the Soviet Union was increasing its aid to North Vietnam was that they didn't know what would happen. But now there can be no excuses. When the red tide of blood and steel rolls over the 4.5 million people of El Salvador and hundreds of thousands of refugees clamor to come to the U.S., those who opposed adequate aid to the anti-communist government of El Salvador will frantically thrash around looking for someone else to blame. But they will search elsewhere in vain. All they will have to do to see who is at fault is to look in the mirror.

What an indictment of U.S. policy! Millions of hapless Central Americans face the prospect of being trapped inside a totalitarian tyranny because the U.S. is fearful to act. Additional hundreds of thousands—many millions if Mexico is overrun—will head north, some as new "boat people," into the U.S. if possible. (How could the U.S. prevent it, really?) As Louis Gann of the Hoover Institute in Stanford told me recently, insurrections in Central America present an attractive "side benefit" for the Soviet Union—the chance to disrupt American society with the sudden inrush of millions of foreigners.
