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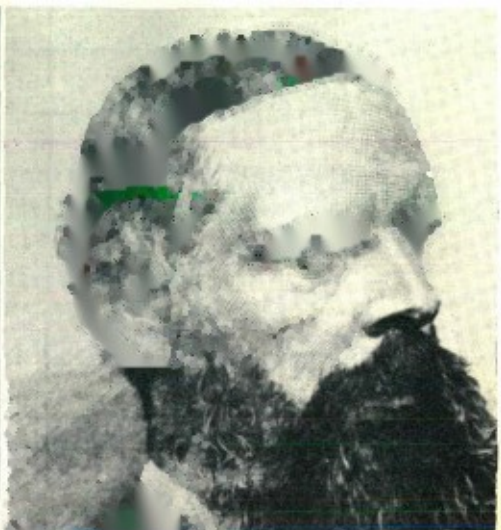
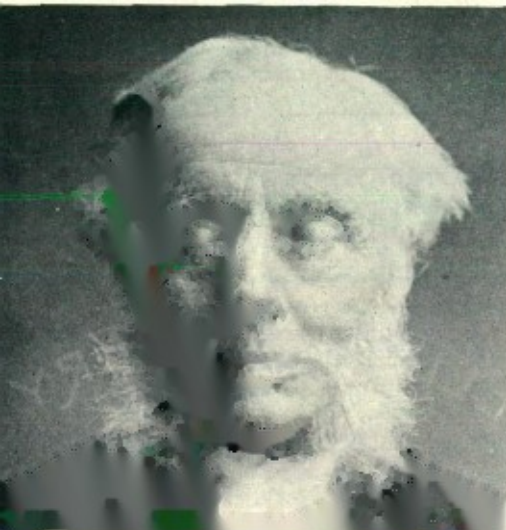


Fig. 1. Wax bust of the author, showing the facial features and the beard.

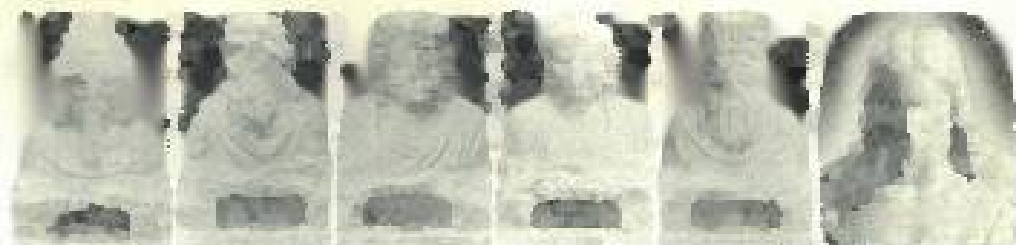


Fig. 1. Stone sculpture of a seated Buddha figure, showing different views.

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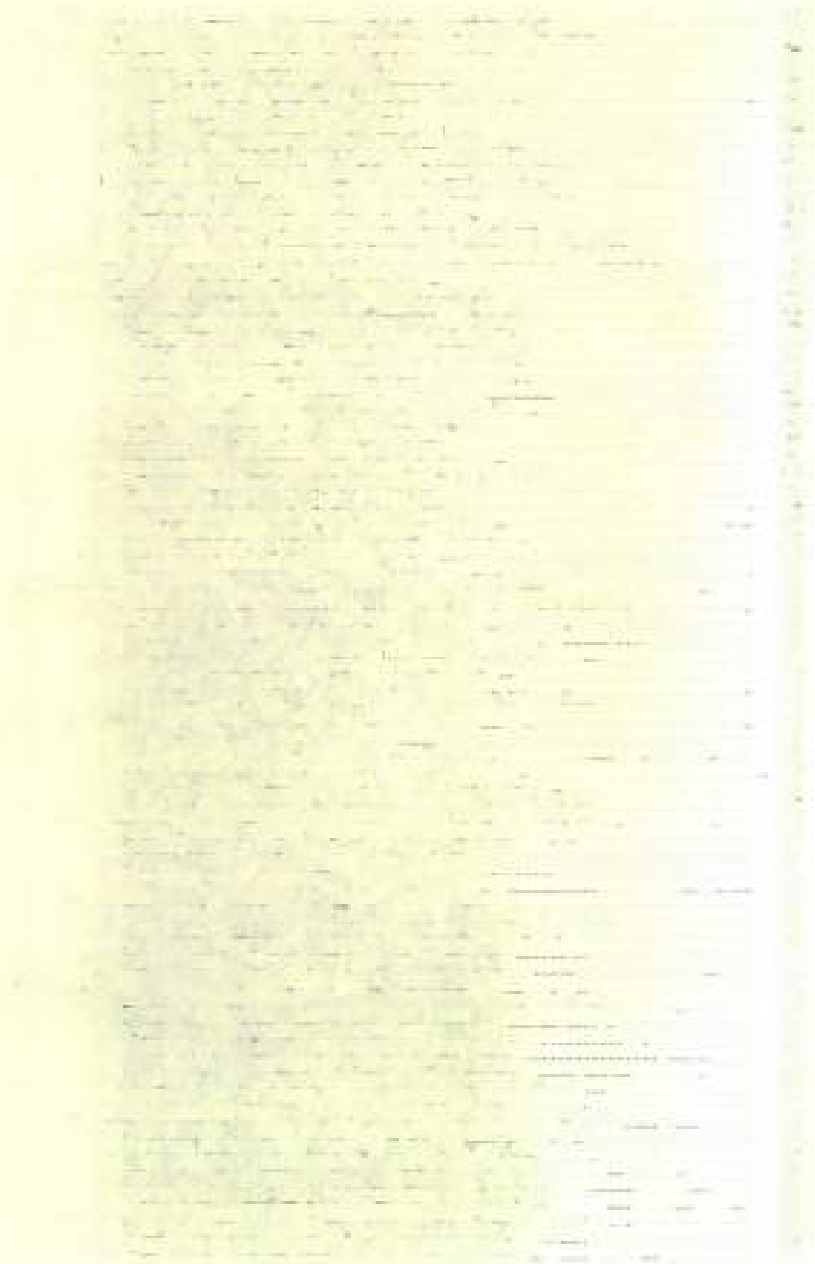


FIG. 10. Same as in Fig. 9, but for the difference in the time-averaged monthly mean precipitation rate between the 1979–99 and 1950–78 periods.
